Contingent Check List:

1. Previously

By now, your Contingent Management Team should already have fully registered your Contingent in the Jamboree Registration System. By fully we mean all the names in the system, participants in the right patrols, IST with their skills and preferences. You should also have paid your Jamboree registration fees.

If you haven't registered by now, please contact contingent.support@worldscoutjamboree.se and tell us how many people will be in your Contingent and when you will be able to register and pay your fees.

2. Prepare your Contingent Members

The better you prepare your Contingent, the better experience they will have at the Jamboree. In Bulletin 5 you can read some tips on how to prepare participants, unit leaders and IST.

Make sure all your Contingent members have the information they need to do their own preparations. Things to consider include preparatory activities, packing lists, information about visa applications, and how to book tickets to your Contingent meeting points.

If you have contact details for your Contingent Management Team during the Jamboree, make sure that all your participants' parents have received these details.

3. Finalise your travel plans register your plans and passport details

If you haven't already done so, it is now time to book all your tickets and finalise your travel plans. Please fill in your travel details in the Jamboree Registration System as soon as possible, and no later than 30 April 2011. This will ensure that we can arrange transportation between the entry points and the Jamboree. Remember that IST members must arrive on site 25 July and leave 8 August, and participants and unit leaders must arrive 27 July and leave 7 August.

If any members of your Contingent will need a visa to enter Sweden or the Schengen zone, please fill in their passport details in the registration system before 30 April 2011. More information about this further on in the bulletin.

4. Insurance

Please ensure that everyone in your Contingent obtains appropriate insurance cover that includes medical costs and personal belongings for the entire Jamboree period and any additional time they will be travelling before or after the Jamboree. You should also arrange insurance for your own Contingent equipment. If you are from a European country, remember that every member of your Contingent should have with them their European Insurance Card. For more information on healthcare and insurance please see "Terms and Conditions for the 22^{nd} World Scout Jamboree" in Bulletin 2.

5. Contingent Contributions to Programme

If you are planning to bring any activities to the Jamboree, make sure that you have registered these activities with the Jamboree Organisers. If you are not already in contact with one of the Jamboree Teams, send a complete description of the activity you are planning to contingent.support@worldscoutjamboree.se.

6. Information

Reread all the Jamboree Bulletins and Circulars. The bulletins and circulars are our primary way of communicating with the Contingent Management Teams (CMT). This is our sixth and final bulletin, and we have also sent out four circulars. All bulletins and circulars are available on the Contingent Extranet.

The Contingent Extranet works as a complement to the bulletins and circulars. In addition to the publications you can also find information from the Heads of Contingent visits, forms and other information. If you have difficulties accessing the internet and would like us to send a printed copy of something that has been published on the Contingent Extranet, please contact the Jamboree Office.

Visa – follow up

Visa Applications and Support

Anyone holding a passport from a country outside the European Economic Area may need a visa to enter Sweden before they can attend the World Scout Jamboree. Check the nationality and passports of all members of your Contingent against the *List of foreign citizens who require visa for entry into Sweden* available at www.sweden.gov.se/visa to see if any members of your Contingent will need a visa.

All visa applications must be submitted well in advance of the Jamboree.

Important points about visa applications:

- Make a thorough inventory of Contingent members, and identify if any members of your Contingent need an entry visa to Sweden.
- Register all the necessary details about every member of your Contingent needing a visa in good time, at the very latest by 30 April 2011!
- You will receive a Letter of Invitation from the Jamboree Office for all registered Contingent members who are in need of a visa.
- Identify the appropriate embassy or consulate for your visa application.

- Find out what are the requirements for visa application and deadlines to be met at your place of application.
- Focus first on the visa application for those under 18 in your Contingent. Special rules may apply requiring, for example, approvals from parents.
- Start the application process at the earliest possible point of time. Note that there are also rules about earliest possible time to apply for a visa!
- Apply for a "Schengen visa".
- Confirm with your place of application that you have completed all needed steps
- Contact the Jamboree Office if you need additional support for your visa application.

Remember that you should also have all required documents available when you start your journey to Sweden. You will find a Visa Application Guide on the Contingent Extranet with more detailed information. You can also read more at the website of the Swedish Foreign Ministry www.swedenabroad.com.

Visitors – a reminder!

This is a short summary of information on Visitors given earlier, for further details see primarily Bulletin 4.

Day Visitors

The 22nd World Scout Jamboree will be open for day visitors from Thursday 28 July until Saturday 6 August 2011, with the exception of Thursday 4 August.

Visitors are welcome onsite from 10.00 to 18.00 (last entry at 16.00) to experience all the common areas of the Jamboree at their leisure. Visitors entry includes a guided tour. For further information please see www.worldscoutjamboree.se/visitors.

The price for a one day ticket is 150 SEK for adults and 75 SEK for children aged 7-17 and are available via the Jamboree web shop: www.worldscoutjamboree.se/shop.

Contingent Guests

Contingents have the possibility to invite a limited number of officials from their NSO to visit the Contingent for up to three days and nights during the Jamboree. Contingent Guests will stay at the Jamboree just as any other member of the Contingent Management Team, including bringing their own tents to the camp. When the guests arrive at the Jamboree they will need to check in at the welcome centre southeast of the camp site.

Please observe that Contingents need to register all Contingent Guests in the registration system by 1 May 2011 at the latest. The fee is 800 SEK per guest per night.

Special Guests

All participating countries will have an opportunity to share the Jamboree experience with prominent citizens of their country. For example Heads of State, ranking government officials, Members of Parliament, ambassadors, and prominent private citizens including representatives from the cultural, educational or business communities might qualify as a Special Guest.

Please note that individuals to be included in the Special Guest programme need to be invited in advance by the Jamboree Executive Team. Contingents are invited to nominate individual Special Guests, using the "Nomination of Special Guest Form" (App. IV with Bulletin 4). Please return it by 1 May 2011 at the latest.

It is important to note that not all those who are nominated may be able to take part in the Special Guest programme. Therefore please do not contact your proposed guest directly as it may not be possible to accommodate everyone.

All arrangements will be closely coordinated with the relevant National Contingents.

Receptions

During the Jamboree, Contingents will have the possibility to host receptions. At the centrally located area it will be possible to host receptions in tents as well as outdoors. The reception area will be available every day, except arrival and departure days, for receptions starting between 15.00 and 18.00. This means that the number of receptions that can be hosted will be limited and we encourage Contingents to hold receptions together with others.

We will cooperate with a caterer to provide different alternatives of affordable food for the receptions. All food served at receptions must be stored, prepared and served in accordance with the European food safety regulations. We therefore strongly recommend that Contingents work with the Reception Area Team to purchase items for receptions locally. A menu and pricelist is available on the Contingent Extranet or upon request.

We also want to remind you it will not be possible to serve alcohol at receptions or anywhere else at the Jamboree.

If you plan on holding a reception, we ask you to please complete the "Application for Contingent Reception Form" (App. V with Bulletin 4). Reception applications must be submitted by 30 April 2011.

Names of Towns and Subcamps

In Bulletin 4 we informed you that there will be four Towns for the participants, plus an adult town. We have since made an adjustment so that we will have four Towns in total, three for participants and unit leaders and one for IST members and other adults.

The Towns will be named after the four seasons. In Scandinavia the changes in nature are great between the different seasons, which will be reflected in the different Towns. The three Towns where the participants and unit leaders will live are named Summer, Autumn and Winter, while IST members and other adults will live in the adult town named Spring.

All Towns (except Spring) consist of six Subcamps, making a total of 18 Subcamps. The Subcamps will be named after geographical locations in Sweden. All Subcamp names are connected to the specific season (Town) they are situated in, depending on what that specific place is known for. At the Subcamps and Subcamp Centres the theme will also be reflected in for example the activities available or the food and beverage served. As a preparatory activity your units will get to know what Subcamp they will be staying in, and then learn more about that particular location. Subcamp placement will be sent out closer to the Jamboree. The names are the following:

Subcamps in Summer:

Finnerödja – an area famous for its grand strawberry fields.

Karlstad – a town where the sun always shines.

Smögen – a small summer town by the sea with fabulous seafood.

Stockholm – a city built on islands and the capital of Sweden.

Vimmerby – the birthplace of the famous children's book author, Astrid Lindgren, where, during the summer, you can meet Pippi Longstocking, Karlsson-on-the-roof and her other famous characters.

Visby – a medieval town located on the popular summer island of Gotland.

Subcamps in Autumn:

Bohuslän – a province where you can fish the famous crayfish that is feasted on in early autumn.

Hunneberg – a beautiful national park situated by the largest lake in Sweden, Vänern.

Kivik – a town famous for hosting a big apple market in autumn.

Klarälven – a river where they used to drive logs, now great for rafting.

Sarek – a national park in the far north of Sweden, with a wonderful display of colours in early autumn.

Svedala – in the vicinity of Svedala you can stroll in colourful beech forests during autumn.

Subcamps in Winter:

Jukkasjärvi – a town in northern Sweden famous for its ice hotel.

Kiruna – the most northern town in Sweden.

Mora – after 90 km of skiing one of the world's longest skiing competitions ends in this town.

Polcirkeln (the Polar Circle) – north of here the sun never rises for at least one day in December.

Åre – Sweden's oldest ski area which has hosted world championships in alpine skiing.

Örnsköldsvik – famous for its world class ice hockey players.

Material available

Cooking food at the Jamboree

Cooking in the Subcamps will mainly take place on gas ring cookers supplied in the Patrol Kit. But each unit will also have a fireplace with the possibility to cook on open fire. It is a shared fireplace and up to each unit to share between the patrols in the unit. Each unit will get the necessary equipment for cooking food on open fire for one patrol (a fireplace kit). We encourage you to invite other patrols and units to gather around the open fire, cooking your national food or your favorite dish.

Depending how each unit divides the use of the fireplace, each patrol will get the possibility to cook 2-4 meals on open fire during the Jamboree. During the Camp in Camp experience most patrols will also cook their food on open fire. Gas and firewood will be supplied at an amount sufficient to cook all meals. The amount will however not be enough for other additional use of fuel. The material included in the fireplace kit will be added to the material listed in the Patrol Kit (see Bulletin 5). Pictures of the Patrol Kit items are available

on the Contingent Extranet, and soon pictures of the fireplace kit will be added as well.

Pioneering poles

Pioneering is a great part of Scouting in many countries. In Sweden Scouts usually build structures such as tables and benches, gateways and fireplaces. At the Jamboree the participants will also have the possibility to build some things with poles in their unit area. Table, benches and fireplace will be supplied in the Patrol Kit, but it might be fun to build a nice gateway to the Unit Area. The Contingents will receive at least one pioneering pole per participant.

What to pack?

An updated list of what to pack for the Jamboree (original list in Bulletin 5) is now available on the Contingent Extranet. You will find the list under 'Facts & FAQs' and 'Subcamp life'.

Spring = Adult Town

Spring is a huge Town for 10 000 adults. This is where IST, Contingent Management Teams, Jamboree Planning Team and Contingent Guests will be staying. Contingents will be allocated plots for 40 persons (enough plots for all their adults) and these plots will be mixed into a truly international Town called Spring.

Access to Spring is restricted to adults. Unit leaders are welcome to visit Spring in their free time, but participants should not enter this part of the site. (There will be some children belonging to members of the Jamboree Planning Team and Contingent Management Teams camping in Spring).

In Spring you will find all the facilities needed: showers, dining hall, information desk, kiosks, cafés and free-time activities.

Food

Food for the adults living in Spring will be prepared onsite and served in the dining hall: three meals a day, breakfast, lunch and dinner. There will be hot food served for lunch and dinner, with vegetarian alternatives and special food for those with special dietary needs.

For the IST members who are working at night and to facilitate for those who are fasting because of Ramadan, there will be food available during night-time.



Programme

At the Jamboree there will be scheduled and spontaneous programme as well as arena events. In previous bulletins you have received a taste of what the participants can expect, and on the following pages you will receive a presentation of some of the programme as we hope the participants will experience it. The texts are directed at the participants, and can be used by your unit leaders when preparing their Scouts for the Jamboree.

Module Activities

We have planned a programme of activities that will help you to meet, interact and build friendships with Scouts from all over the world. The module activities have five opportunities for you to do this and we hope that during the Jamboree you will take those opportunities and spend your days with us. When you arrive at PEOPLE you will be greeted by a team of enthusiastic IST members who will offer you the chance to experience and explore many of the elements that make up world cultures. You will explore the cultural groups that you belong to and find out more about who you are and what you believe, what things you have in common with your brother and sister Scouts and the things that make you a unique individual. Maybe you and your patrol can come up with a culture of your own. The city of people will be filled with parks and streets, theatres and a market, a city of tranquillity and noise, laughter and music.

On the day your Subcamp is to visit 'People', grab that opportunity; what better way to learn more about yourself and the people around you.

The World Leaders at QUEST are awaiting your arrival. They have been eagerly preparing for a long time now to astonish your mind with challenges and build your thirst for adventure. Arrive on time because you will be treated to an opening ceremony, a musical extravaganza taking place at the main portal. From the portal you will be transported to different time Zones: Discovery, Medieval, Viking and Cave. Satisfy your quest for adventure by travelling between these worlds and challenge other patrols in physical and intellectual activities while taking part in the overall QUEST challenge. Quest will be a work out for both your brain and your body.

Across the programme site, the staff at EARTH are hoping that you will discover the magic in the soil, the power of water and why the wind is more than just the movement of air. Before you get to the Earth module perhaps you can put some thought into the challenges your home environment faces and how your patrol might initiate some solutions, and bring those thoughts with you. You will find time here to experiment with the elements and reflect on how we as Scouts can make this a better Earth.

Gather at the Global Development Village (GDV) and share the experiences of Scouting around the world. In the GDV there will be exhibitions and workshops delivered by major international partner organisations of World Scouting. Be inspired by the models on display and interact with exhibitors. Learn to think globally and act locally to make a difference and create a better world.

Do you only Dream at night? This **DREAM** will focus on your path through life and it is the Jamboree's only night activity. Embark on a magical journey through life and find adventure in a different way. No matter who we are, what we do, what we believe, the Dream will happen.

All of the Module Activities will begin at 10.00 each day and finish at 15.00 with the exception of Dream which will start at 22.00 and finish at 02.00. Watch out for your timetable to attend each Module, but do take the opportunity to attend them all.

International Friendship Award

Are you ready for a Challenge? Get to know people from all over the world, make new friends, and earn one of the most coveted badges of the entire camp!

Do you have problem-solving skills and work well with other Scouts? Are you curious about different languages and cultures? Do you know your Scouting? Then this is something for you to attempt.

The International Friendship Award challenge is run for participants at every World Scout Jamboree and reflects many of the core values of Scouting. The International Friendship Award for the 22nd World Scout Jamboree is based around cultural exchange and challenges you to undertake quizzes and tasks across the campsite. Participants must team up into patrols of 4-8 people from at least two different nationalities and

take on an array of physical and mental tasks. These are set to test and expand your knowledge of the camp, the host country, Scouting and other cultures, and to meet new friends along the way. Tasks have to be completed within a timed period so speed and dedication is of the essence! What better way to get to explore the camp and its participants? And at the end of this challenge your reward awaits: the unique International Friendship Badge for the 22nd World Scout Jamboree, a symbol of meetings between Scouts all over the world, plus –of course — the friendships you will make along the way.

The International Friendship Award will be run from the Town Centres. Upon starting, the participants will have exactly 24 hours to finish the challenge. After the time has run out the badge will not be awarded, so dedication will be necessary.

The Jamboree Forum

A World Scout Jamboree is a unique opportunity for young people from different backgrounds to meet and exchange ideas. An important part of Scouting is to learn advocacy and how to influence the societies around us in a positive way.

At the camp there will be a Jamboree Forum where the participants will have the opportunity to discuss different topics using moderated working methods stimulating dialogue between different opinions. The topics will all be of high relevance to young people in the world today, including social, environmental and democratic issues. We now invite NSOs to recommend topics and individuals who could be guest speakers at one of these sessions. Camp in Camp

Nordic Scout groups invite you to Camp in Camp, a unique camping experience for all World Scout Jamboree participants. It is your chance to experience a small Scout camp in the beautiful nature of Southern Sweden! Camp in Camp will take place on a small campsite no more than a two-hour bus ride from the main Jamboree campsite. It is an overnight stay, from lunch to lunch, and you will go together with your patrol and at least four other patrols from different countries. All patrols must be accompanied by a unit leader.

Scout groups from the whole of Sweden and some from Denmark, Norway and Finland have located their annual summer camps in the area surrounding Rinkaby. They have been preparing for your visit for over a year and are very much looking forward to meeting all of you!

Each Camp in Camp experience will be different as the Nordic host groups are responsible for the programme. A lot of you will probably try canoeing or swimming in a lake, preparing wood and cooking food over an open fire, playing new games and most importantly, meeting new friends. There will be a nice campfire in the evening, so your patrols should prepare something to perform.

Camp in Camp takes place between 31 July and 3 August. Each patrol will be scheduled for one of these

three nights. You will get more information about Camp in Camp at the unit leader meeting before you leave for Camp in Camp.

What you need to bring

- Clothes for a day
- Rainwear, warm sweater/jacket
- Swimming gear
- Eating utensils
- Personal care set
- Sleeping bag
- A sleeping pad. Try to avoid bringing camping-beds or big mattresses.


All this should be packed in a smaller bag suited for overnight stay. The Camp in Camp hosts will provide tents for you so you do not need to bring your own.

Food at Camp in Camp

Each patrol will bring their own food from the Jamboree to the Camp in Camp. The Camp in Camp hosts will provide similar kitchen equipment to what has been provided in the Patrol Kit. If you have brought or ordered special kitchen utensils for the Jamboree, you should also bring them to Camp in Camp.

Spontaneous Activities



At the Main Square...

...we will offer a wide range of activities. You can experience activities based on the key concepts nature, meetings and solidarity, as well as adventure. For example, we can offer climbing, Most Primitive Scouting Experience (MPSE), SenseAction Cinema, sport activities, tivoli (amusement park), badge swapping, Scout museum, Radio Scouting and much more.

All activities are open for everyone; participants, IST members, visitors etc. but participants have first priority at some of the activities. The general opening hours are 10.00 to 20.00. There will be some exceptions; for example the crafts village open at 15.00 and some activities will also be open longer, until 22.00.

The Tivoli Area will be located near the big arena. Here you can enjoy a ride in the ferris wheel or try the merry-











go-round. There is also a tower of hay where you can climb up and come down with a cableway.

In the Town Centres...

...there will be exciting drop-in activities for everyone. Accept a one-minute challenge, play a game with your new friends or sharpen your juggling skills to impress them! Of course, you can also sit down and create something of your own design to bring home, or add your contribution to a common project.

The Town Centres let you experience the seasons not only through their design, but also through their unique activities: the snow and ice of Winter, the water and sun of Summer, and the crispness and colours of Autumn. Some activities are available in all Town Centres, or travel from town to town. If you don't want to miss anything, you must visit all three!

Some activities are open all day, from 10.00 to 22.00, but most open in the afternoon and close before darkness falls.

In the Subcamp Centres...

... we offer a selection of small scale activities. You can select from different board games, borrow smaller sports equipment or perhaps learn a completely new skill!

It is also possible to contribute with activities, if you have something fun that you want to share with others you just need to inform the staff in the Subcamp Centres and they will add this to the activity list.

At the stages in the Subcamp Centres, there might be a singer performing or a music quiz going on – come and listen and join in. Maybe one of your patrols or units would like to perform? They can book a stage at the Subcamp Centre and run their own activity or perform.

There will also be activities for the unit leaders. There will be small workshops at the Subcamp Centres where they can discuss, create or just listen.





Cultural Festival Day - an update

The Cultural Festival Day (4 August) is an opportunity to show your culture and share others, and we hope you are all busy preparing your contribution to this day.

Outline of the day

In the morning you will have time to prepare your food, costumes, performances and activities for the day. By around lunchtime, our Camp in Camp hosts have arrived at the Jamboree site and the Cultural Festival starts.

There are various ways for you to contribute to the Cultural Festival. You can perform music, dance etc, you can run your favorite activities and you can prepare some finger food that is typical for your country or region and share it with others. All this will take place in the Subcamps and Town Centres, on stages and on basically any free, open area. The normal activities and exhibitions at Town Centres, the Main Square and the Faith and Beliefs area will also be up and running during the Festival so there will be a lot of things to do. The whole Jamboree site will be a colorful, noisy and sizzling melting pot of cultures.

After a break for dinner we gather at Subcamps and Town Centres for a Carnival Procession that will take everyone to the evening show at the Main Arena. The Carnival Procession will include music, costumes, laughter and singing with everyone creating the atmosphere together.

Stages

If you want to use a stage during the day, you can book this at the Jamboree. There are a handful of stages of various sizes and the sooner you book after you arrive at the Jamboree, the better we can help arrange for what you need. The stages have sound systems and there will be stage hosts present to help you with the technical equipment.

Food

One way to contribute to the Cultural Festival Day is to prepare some simple traditional finger food or snack to share with others. To do this, the Contingents need to bring or in other ways arrange for the ingredients needed. The Jamboree Organisers have a limited number of ingredients that the Contingents can order and pay for Please see the Contingent Extranet for a complete list including price and ordering instructions.

Your ingredients order needs to be made by 31 May, at the latest. Later than this we are unable to assist you. The food ordered in time will be distributed to your Contingent Headquarters and you will then manage the distribution out to your units.

Any ingredients not found on the list will have to be brought by you to the Jamboree. Please ensure that you know what customs regulations there are for bringing food from your country to Sweden and that you can ensure good food hygiene.



Ceremonies at the Jamboree







During the 22nd World Scout Jamboree there will be three major events where all 38 000 attending the Jamboree gather in front of the main stage. The events will be inspired by the three key concepts Meetings, Nature and Solidarity. There will also be a special Lighthouse Celebration open to everyone, and opening and closing shows for the hard working IST members.

IST Opening Show (26 July)

We'll kick start the 22nd World Scout Jamboree and the IST Experience with the IST Opening Show. This is the high point of this day, dedicated solely to the IST members. Beginning with the IST introduction programme, continuing with the Opening Show, and ending the day with a Jamboree party in Spring.

Meetings the Opening Ceremony (28 July)

Through music, performance and fun you will get to know Sweden while meeting the world. Enjoy all the colours of the flag parade and the raising of the WOSM flag. Be sure to bring your best dance moves as you and 38 000 other Scouts will dance the Jamboree Dance together.

$The \ Lighthouse \ Celebration \ (30 \ July)$

Scouts from all over the world will gather for a special Lighthouse Celebration. The theme of the event is "Be a Lighthouse: Building on Common Beliefs," and will feature video presentations, appearances of Scout groups of various denominations from all over the world, music and a special message to all Scouts. This will be an opportunity that Scouts and leaders alike will not want to miss.

Nature the Mid Event (4 Aug)

This show takes you on a tour through the beautiful Swedish nature, mixed with artists and performances. This is also the finale of the Cultural Festival Day where we welcome the Camp in Camp host groups to the Jamboree camp site.

Solidarity the Closing Ceremony (6 Aug)

The final show and the final day – this will be a tribute to solidarity and friendship all over the world. We will also pass on the torch to Japan for the $23^{\rm rd}$ World Scout Jamboree. As we remember the good times we had at the Jamboree, great artists will entertain you. When the show is over the night has just begun. Disco tunes will fill the field and obviously there's only one thing left to do – dance!

IST Closing Show (7 Aug)

It is time to say good bye, which will be done with an IST Closing Show. This is the time for the Jamboree Team to thank the IST members for the work they have done. And of course, there will be a closing party after the Closing Show.

Flag Parade

During the Opening Ceremony national flags will be presented on the main stage. We ask every NSO to please send a participant in official uniform to carry the flag. We will provide the flags. A rehearsal will take place on the morning of the Opening Ceremony day; the exact time and more information about this will be communicated closer to the event.

Help on Site

It is important that everyone has a safe Jamboree experience, and there are many ways to get help if something happens at the Jamboree. In Bulletin 4 you can read more about what medical facilities will be available on site. There will also be Listening Ears at the Subcamp Centres and religious representatives to talk to in the Faith and Beliefs area. There will be Strolling Stewards all around the campsite who you can ask for directions, help or about any safety matters.

In Bulletin 5 you received information about the Safe from Harm programme. Please note that all IST members need to complete the Safe from Harm online course before the Jamboree, and that the course is available in five languages (English, French, Spanish, Arabic and Russian) on www.worldscoutjamboree.se/safefromharm. We also encourage all other adults in the Contingents to take the course.

Services at the Jamboree

Pharmacy

There will be a pharmacy at the Jamboree, situated on the Main Square in the middle of the camp. It will be open during the daytime, every day of the camp. The pharmacy will sell-self-care products, over the counter medication and prescription medication. To be able to buy a product sold only by prescription you must first contact the Medical Centre before visiting the pharmacy.

Post

There will be a postal service at the camp which will enable everyone to receive and send packages, letters and postcards. You will be able to buy postcards, stamps, envelopes and boxes to send both within Sweden and abroad.

We are still finalising the mail handling process for letters sent to the Jamboree. We will distribute the address where mail for Jamboree participants can be sent closer to the Jamboree. Please note that any mail or packages arriving after the Jamboree will not be forwarded.

Internet

At each Town Centre there will be tents where you can drop in and use computers provided by the camp. You can also bring your own computer and connect with public WiFi or use ethernet cable. There will also be public WiFi available at the Town Centres as well as in other places on the camp site.

Bank

There will be a bank office situated in the Main Square of the Jamboree. For more information please see "Payment methods and currencies" on the following page.

Charging facilities

There will be facilities for charging electronic equipment, at a fee. We however encourage everyone not to bring too much electronic equipment both for safety and environmental reasons.

Additional information about what services will be available will be posted on the Contingent Extranet.



Payment methods and currencies

Payment methods

In order to keep the amount of cash to a minimum at the Jamboree we encourage everyone to use credit/debit cards or cash cards. To facilitate this, the ID-card that everyone in the Contingent (participants, unit leaders, IST and CMT members) receive when checking in will also have a cash card function. This means that it can be charged with money and used when paying in all the cafés, shops etc. on the Jamboree site. It will be optional to use the cash card function on the ID-card, and we encourage those who have credit/debit cards that work internationally to use these. It will also be possible to use cash (SEK, Swedish Krona), but by introducing the cash card solution we hope to increase the safety at the Jamboree.

Credit/debit cards with the following symbols will be accepted at the Jamboree:

There will be a bank on the Jamboree site. At the bank you will be able to exchange money and withdraw cash from ATMs. All prices at the Jamboree will be set in Swedish Krona and it will be the only currency accepted in the shops, cafés etc.

Contingent HQ - CMT Service Centre

In the Contingent Headquarters and Exhibition Area, you will find an information centre, the CMT Service Centre. The CMT Service Centre is divided into three sections: the Information Desk, the Office and the Lounge.

The Information Desk is the single point of contact for Contingent Management Teams during daily operations. This is where you can go with just about any question you might have and we will do our very best to find the answers for you. It is also at the Information Desk that you will find the pigeon holes (Contingent post box). Each Contingent will have its own pigeon hole which will be used to distribute information to Contingents, such as the minutes from the daily Heads of Contingent meetings. It can also be used to pass on a message from one Contingent to another. So be sure to drop by the Information Desk at least a couple of times every day.

The Office is a place where you as a Contingent Management Team member can sit down and do some work. We have internet connected computers (installed with office applications, card readers and CD/DVD burners), printers, copiers and a fax machine. If you bring your own computer, we offer Wi-Fi internet access. We also have meeting facilities, with Wi-Fi internet access and a whiteboard.

The **Lounge** is a place for you to sit down, relax and take a short break from the daily rush. We offer a relaxed and cozy atmosphere where you can sit and read a newspaper, challenge someone to a board game, read a comic book or just hang and talk to fellow Contingent Management Team members from around the world.



Please note that Contingents who did not submitTentOrderForms before 30 September 2010 requesting space for the Contingent Headquarters will be allocated a Contingent HQ area of 9 square metres. Simply Sustainability

Climate change, global warming, CO2 emissions and the greenhouse effect: nobody knows exactly how great the future environmental impacts will be, but it is clear that we all have to contribute to make Earth a healthy and sustainable place to live. As Scouts, we want to make it happen so let us start here and now!

A Green Jamboree

The 22nd World Scout Jamboree will be the first, but hopefully not the last, eco-awarded Jamboree! This means that the Jamboree has fulfilled certain requirements regarding environment and sustainability by implementing measures that minimise the Jamboree's usage of natural resources. For example all the coffee, bananas and cocoa at the Jamboree will be eco-labelled. The Jamboree's Sustainability Policy and more information about the award is available at www.worldscoutjamboree.se and the Contingent Extranet.

Reduce, Reuse, Recycle

Scouting is about creating a better world. The Jamboree will have an impact on the natural environment, but by simple procedures and climate smart choices, your Contingent can greatly contribute to making the Jamboree as sustainable as possible. As a rule of thumb, there are three R's to remember in order of appearance: Reduce, Reuse, Recycle! It is as simple as that. Here are some examples of what your Contingent can do:

Reduce

- Reduce your environmental impact by planning your travel to and from the Jamboree site. Go by train or bus if possible and avoid unnecessary travel.
- Reduce pollution caused by transportation of goods over long distances by buying eco-labelled and locally produced products.
- Reduce the number of plastic bags. Bring your own bag when you go shopping.
- Reduce your food waste. Plan your meals to minimise waste and save leftovers that are safe to keep, instead of throwing them away. Please see the Menu Book already available on the Contingent Extranet- for suggestions.
- Save water by closing the tap whenever you don't need running water. Fill a container when preparing food or cleaning your teeth.

Reuse

- Refill your water bottle instead of buying new ones. The tap water in Sweden is safe to drink.
- Bring your own cup to the cafés, food houses and the dining hall in Spring.

Recycle

• Recycle your waste, such as cans, bottles and packages, at the recycling stations all around the campsite.

Recycle for a green Jamboree

At the World Scout Jamboree, we will take care of the waste so it affects the environment as little as possible. To be able to do this, we all need to sort and throw the waste in the right bins. Thank you for helping with this and thus making a major contribution to the environment.

Each thing that we can use again saves the Earth's resources. Leftover food is processed into biogas that will be used as fuel for cars and buses and also into sludge used as agricultural fertilizer. An old newspaper becomes part of a new one and a shampoo bottle can become a brush. In addition, less energy is used to make new products from recycled materials compared to making it from new materials such as wood and iron.

How to sort waste in the Unit Area:

When you cook, save all packaging. When all dishes are washed, use your dishwater to rinse out dirty containers. When the packaging is clean, sort it into the intended bins. Food scraps from cooking and leftover food on the plates should be placed in a paper bag in the food waste recycling bin. When you go to the supermarket, take the recycling boxes that are getting full with you and empty them in the containers at the manned recycling station.

How to sort waste when you're at the common camp areas:

In cafés and shops, there are recycling bins for the packaging materials and items sold there. Please sort as much as possible here. Along the streets there are bins for sorting the most common waste types. Sort the packaging that is not too dirty. All around the camp area there are bins where you can throw away rubbish that cannot be recycled.



Bring a little pocket money

At the Jamboree you will find various shops and cafés all over the camp. The **kiosks**, where you can buy smaller things such as snacks, ice-cream, candy or a cool drink in the summer heat, are the smallest kind of shops. At the **cafés**, on the other hand, you can sit down and have a chat with friends while having lunch or simply a cup of coffee and something sweet. There will also be sales points that have a wider assortment than a kiosk, also selling personal hygiene products such as toothbrushes, soap and shampoo.

The main cafeteria in each Town Centre serves hot food during lunch as well as hot and cold beverages,

sandwiches, ice-cream and also some lighter meals during the day. Apart from the kiosks, cafés and cafeterias there will be **food houses** hosted by Contingents. At a food house you can taste a number of specialties from that specific country while learning something new about the culture.

Last but not least is the **Jamboree shop** where you will be able to buy everything from souvenirs and badges to different kinds of profiled clothes and out-door equipment. Our aim is to have something for everyone. The shop will be located on the Main Square in the centre of the camp.



Transport Update

Arrivals

On the participant arrival day (27 July) teams will welcome and help Contingents when arriving at one of the official entry points for the camp.

The official entry points are:

- Camp site (Check-in Centre at Rinkaby Airfield)
- Copenhagen International Airport (CPH, Denmark)
- Malmö Airport (MMX)
- Kristianstad Railway Station
- Kristianstad Airport (KID)
- Åhus Harbour.

Please note that the above mentioned entry points that are airports refer to Contingents arriving by plane 27 July. The airports will not be entry points for Contingents who arrive by coach; they need to continue all the way to the Jamboree.

Every participant needs to be registered in a Travel Group in the Jamboree Registration System. We will use this information to plan your transport between the entry points and the Jamboree, as well as use it for the check-in at the Jamboree.

At the airport the Travel Group leader shall contact the World Scout Jamboree Arrival Team in the luggage reclaim area where they will receive information about the transfer to the campsite. For participants who have been on Home Hospitality before the camp there will be special transportation from the Home Hospitality location to an entry point.

Coach transfers will be available from the entry points as well as the parking areas at the Jamboree site. They will take participants and unit leaders to the Check-in Centre at Rinkaby Airfield just next to the Jamboree campsite. A more detailed instruction on how the check-in process will work and the responsibility of the Travel Group leader will be distributed closer to the Jamboree.

Following the check-in process, the transfer coaches will continue from the Check-in Centre to the World Scout Jamboree campsite. At the campsite the group will be guided to their Subcamp. Please note that you might need to walk up to 1 ½ km, so make sure all luggage is packed in appropriate bags.

On the IST arrival day (25 July) there will also be welcome teams at the entry points and a similar routine as for participants and unit leaders will apply.

Departures

At the end of the Jamboree, coach transfers will be available from the Jamboree site to the departure points (same as listed above) or Home Hospitality locations.

The departure day for participants is 7 August and for IST members 8 August.

The Contingents must confirm their departure details with Contingent Support at the Jamboree. The Jamboree Personal Transport Team will set the time of departure from the Jamboree site in order to meet flights etc. The decision will be based on time of day or night, likely traffic conditions and so on.

Please note that the transport between the designated entry points and the Jamboree site is included in the Jamboree fee.

Scout knives

As the closest international airport is located in Copenhagen, many of you will be travelling through Denmark. Please note that according to Danish law you may not under any circumstances carry a knife when sightseeing or travelling in Denmark. Knives may not at all be included in hand luggage when travelling by plane, so please ensure that any knives are safely packed away in your checked-in luggage.

Regulations for bringing food into Sweden

The regulations on bringing food from outside the European Union are very strict. Please check before you consider bringing something. We cannot replace food if it is confiscated.

Shuttle services during the Jamboree

There will be local shuttle services available for members of the IST and Contingent Management Teams from the Jamboree site to Kristianstad during the Jamboree. This service is not available for the participants or unit leaders.

If someone from your Contingent gets ill and needs to stay at the local hospital, transport will be provided for CMT members or unit leaders who need to visit members of their Contingent.

There will be a vehicle service for those with disabilities. It is important to provide requirements well ahead of the World Scout Jamboree via the Jamboree Registration System.

Goods

Contingents will need to provide us with shipping information in advance. Please fill in the "Goods Transport Form" available on the Contingent Extranet and return it to

contingent.support@worldscoutjamboree.se no later than two weeks before the goods are due to arrive. This form is in addition to the "Preliminary Goods Transport Form" that you have previously submitted.

Please note the following when making bank transfers:

- Each transfer must include both the name of your National Scout Organization and a reference to what the payment should cover (for example "deposit for 100 people").
- Please inform the Jamboree Office about every transfer you make, including the date the transfer was sent, the bank from which it was sent, the reference information you included and the amount you believe we shall receive.
- The amount credited to your National Scout Organization will be net of any bank charges applied by your bank AND our bank upon receipt of the transfer.
- All payments must be made in SEK (Swedish Kronor).

A reminder of the refund policy for the World Scout Jamboree:

Up to 30 April 2011 (3 months before): credit given for up to 5 % reduction in registered numbers

After 1 May 2011: no credit or refund for any reduction in registered numbers

For example, if you have registered and paid for 100 people on 23 February 2010 and then on 15 April 2011 you inform us that your Contingent will only be 85 people, we will only give you credit for payments of 5 people, not 15 people. Please note that allowances for reductions in numbers will be in the form of a credit against future payments, rather than as refund – unless no future payments are due, in which case a refund will be made.
